

## **An Extraordinary Journey:** From Humble Beginnings to Lasting Impact

While preparing for his October retirement, Gary Seech, President, took a moment to reflect on his career.

When he arrived in Rock Creek in 1983, Glenbeigh had a total of 17 patients. Over the years, he played a pivotal role in Glenbeigh's expansion and in providing exceptional care and positive experiences for patients and their loved ones.

"I have been truly blessed," Gary said. "Upon my first encounter with the Glenbeigh staff, I was deeply impressed. Their unwavering dedication to delivering life-saving care, while guiding individuals towards long-term recovery, is a calling that endures to this day."

At the outset of his career with Glenbeigh, Gary's role involved providing administrative support to leadership, which encompassed overseeing service departments and human resources.

It was during these early days that Gary crossed paths with the thenclinical director for women's services, Pat Weston-Hall. Gary recalled that his initial days at Glenbeigh were overwhelming, but Pat extended a warm welcome. She shared her own journey and illuminated the transformative power of recovery.

Having no prior experience with substance use disorders, Gary delved into extensive reading on addiction and treatment. He also attended recovery support meetings to understand the pivotal role fellowship plays in long-term recovery.

"Gary cares for our employees, patients, and their families," remarked Terri Ball, Director of Clinical Operations. "He proved to be an exceptional choice to lead Glenbeigh, steering the organization through unprecedented challenges and empowering employees to excel."

Looking ahead, Gary is eager to continue his efforts in supporting individuals in recovery through board work and to become more deeply involved in charitable and educational initiatives in the Pittsburgh area. He also plans to devote more time to his family. It marks the perfect conclusion to an illustrious career.

Moreover, he recognized the importance of family, and he played a vital role in helping numerous residents mend their family relationships.

Dave was a cornerstone of recovery support. Whether it was organizing Sunday afternoon family dinners, coordinating staff socials, or spearheading Glenbeigh's holiday events, he could always be found in the midst of it all—basting turkeys, overseeing holiday lighting competitions, or personally reaching out to family members to invite them to gatherings.

In November 2021, Glenbeigh established the Dave Sams Memorial Fund. Given Dave's penchant for engaging with residents outdoors, the vision was to construct a memorial pavilion that would benefit the Niles recovery community. The initial \$6,000 grant from the Community Foundation of the

Mahoning Valley served as a catalyst for launching the fundraising efforts. Since then, the generosity of donors has brought the pavilion project to fruition.

In October 2023, ground was broken, and the pavilion began to take



shape. The construction was completed in early November, and plans are underway for an official ribbon-cutting ceremony.

Looking ahead, the Dave Sams Memorial Fund will continue to promote recovery and strengthen family connections—a reflection of the core values of family and fellowship that Dave embodied.

### **Exploring New Treatment Protocols for Xylazine Use**

Xylazine, a non-opioid drug traditionally used in veterinary medicine, is increasingly found in street drugs. During

the summer of 2023, the White House designated xylazine as an "emerging threat" to people with substance use disorders. Concurrently, the Food and Drug Administration warned of the dangers of xylazine use and the associated skin ulcers that form in soft tissues, potentially leading to infection, sepsis and amputation. Xylazine, when combined with substances such as



fentanyl, can have side effects such as respiratory depression and unintentional overdoses that are unresponsive to the opioid reversal drug naloxone.

When seeking treatment for xylazine use, individuals can experience intense wound pain that may be an obstacle to completing the treatment program. Patients undergoing simultaneous xylazine/opioid withdrawal may experience heightened anxiety, irritability, restlessness and hypertension.

In response, Glenbeigh began to develop symptom management protocols for withdrawal, wound care and addiction treat-

ment as part of a quality improvement program to meet the unique and emerging needs of xylazine users. The evolving

treatment plan includes the implementation of xylazine-specific testing, specialized withdrawal management, unique medication protocols, wound care and monitoring as well as psychotherapeutic treatment.

Individuals are often unaware of the presence of xylazine in the drugs they are using. Xylazine is difficult to detect in standard toxicology screenings. Tissue damage can occur even

when snorting or inhaling the drug and may result in the need for ongoing medical care.

Additional research is needed to fully understand and address the challenges of treating patients who use xylazine, or a combination of opioids and xylazine, to determine the best practices for withdrawal, overdose, wound care and addiction treatment. As xylazine is added to more substances, such as cocaine, benzodiazepines and methamphetamine, the need for advanced treatment protocols remains a high priority at Glenbeigh.

### **Improving Treatment Outcomes**

Led by the Nursing and Quality departments, Glenbeigh collected data to study for the enhancement of treatment outcomes.

In 2021 and 2022, concerning data emerged regarding stimulant users, who exhibited a high rate of premature discharge at the 14-day mark. Because this trend was consistent, Nursing formed a Performance Improvement team focused on reducing premature discharges from in-patient treatment.

To address this issue, the team introduced measures to enhance patient comfort, including pain relief, relaxation techniques. sleep aids and tailored medications. The results in 2022 and 2023 were promising, with a significant decrease in premature discharges for stimulant users at the crucial 14-day mark. Furthermore, as stays lengthened, premature discharge rates continued to decline.

Given the success achieved by the Performance Improvement team in addressing the challenges faced by stimulant users, Glenbeigh continues to implement these changes in its operations. This ongoing dedication to improving treatment outcomes underscores Glenbeigh's unwavering commitment to providing exceptional care and support to individuals seeking recovery.

At Glenbeigh, the pursuit of continual improvement remains a core principle, ensuring that each person's journey towards lasting recovery is met with compassion, effective strategies, and a supportive environment.
